Trout in the Classroom


This school year, 15 schools from VA and NC participated in Trout in the Classroom. More than one thousand students ranging from ages 7-18 witnessed the trout life cycle from eggs to fingerlings followed by a field trip to release their aquatic friends that they had cared for over the last six months into the beautiful Smith River.

At the riverside, students tested the water quality of the Smith River to ensure it was close to the quality of their classroom tanks, with hope that their young trout would survive in their new habitat. The trout releases are always a treat for those that take part in them, as students are bound with energy from being at the river, out in nature, and saying good-bye to their trout.

Students also learn about river ecology and aquatic ecosystems with macroinvertebrates and other wildlife that pass by. Over the years, Great Blue Herons, Bald Eagles, Belted Kingfishers, Mallards, Canada Geese and their goslings, and adult trout have been spotted at the river accesses.

Students and teachers frequently comment that this is their most favorite field trip they have ever been on.

Streamside Trees in the Classroom

Over 500 students participated in the STIC program in 2024. Fourth grade students from Franklin County and Martinsville City rooted black willow cuttings in their classrooms starting in September followed by a field trip to plant them last October.

Planting days were held at Fairy Stone State Park in Patrick County, Philpott Lake's Salthouse Branch Park and Jamison Mill in Franklin County. Students enjoyed field trip planting days as they spent the entire school day in the parks learning about natural resources from local partners and planting their trees along waterways.

The US Army Corps of Engineers and other natural resource partners joined DRBA to assist with planting days by providing hands-on activities and demonstrations for students. Students learned about topics including water cycle, erosion, water quality, water safety, conservation, and invasive and native species identification.

The STIC program strongly correlates with Science Standards of Learning (SOL) guidelines related to plant parts and the role of stems, leaves and roots, along with watersheds and the health of our natural resources.

Purchases made at the Philpott Lake Gift Shop in the Visitor Center help support DRBA's environmental education programs.





Virginia Watershed Awareness at Meadowview Elementary

Students at Meadowview Elementary in Henry County participated in a Virginia Watershed Awareness project, learning about their local watershed and the concept of "we all live downstream." The project reached over 100 fifth grade students.

The watershed awareness project included interactive classroom presentations on watersheds and the student favorite "Tub of Bugs." DRBA also purchased an Enviroscape watershed model for teachers to use on a yearly basis to continue teaching watershed concepts for years to come.





Raising Monarchs and a Monarch Waystation at Patrick Henry Elementary







A nationally certified Monarch Waystation was planted at Patrick Henry Elementary by summer camp students. Nearly 25 students planted the waystation with DRBA staff to include pollinator plants such as common milkweed, coral honeysuckle, bee balm, coreopsis, fennel and black-eyed Susan. Interpretive signage was included that shares information about the importance of waystations to pollinators, especially the monarch butterfly. All second-grade students received monarch butterfly life cycle castles that allowed them to raise and release 16 monarch butterflies on school campus.








Educating the Next Generation of Environmental Stewards







partnered with Snow Creek Elementary in Franklin County to provide all students

in grades K-5 with real world environmental science focused projects,

presentations and activities over the last two years.



DRBA worked closely with staff and administration at Snow Creek Elementary to build lasting environmental education programs that align with Virginia Standards of Learning (SOLs) guidelines and provide authentic hands-on opportunities for students.



DRBA's education staff and Volunteer Environmental Educators (VEEs) provided programs and presentations to students focused on watershed education topics like erosion and ways to control it, such as planting trees, along with water conservation and introducing wildlife that depends on the waterways for survival. Students learned about their local watershed and how pollution can impact waterways through in classroom presentations and investigating aquatic insects.

DRBA worked with Snow Creek Elementary to build a space for upper elementary students to take learning outside in an outdoor classroom. The outdoor learning space includes four picnic tables on a gravel area next to the nationally certified Monarch Waystation where they can investigate and learn about monarch butterflies. The outdoor classroom also includes a rain-barrel water-collection system and a weather monitoring station.



This model is being implemented in Henry County and Martinsville starting in 2025.

Piedmont Regional Governor's School Summer Camp - Stream Investigation

Students from Piedmont Regional Governor's School completed a stream investigation in Hurt, VA, of Sycamore Creek during their summer camp. Sycamore Creek is a tributary of the Roanoke River. During the investigation, a small group of gifted students utilized the VA Save Our Streams testing methods to collect macroinvertebrates from the stream.

Through hands-on, feet-wet education, the students found a variety of macroinvertebrates, or aquatic insects, hiding under rocks in the stream. The macroinvertebrates included crayfish, mayflies, stoneflies, encased caddisflies, and dragonflies. Students also found a common madtom – a small species of catfish that can be found in creeks. Based on their findings, students determined that Sycamore Creek is a healthy waterway.

After the stream investigation, students completed a small litter cleanup of litter that had been spotted in or along the waterway.

MHC After 3 Summer Camp - Smith River Exploration







DRBA partnered with MHC After 3 in Martinsville/Henry County to provide programming for their summer camp in July 2024. Middle school students from Fieldale-Collinsville Middle and Laurel Park Middle participated in a week-long Smith River Exploration.

The program consisted of students learning about our local watershed and how pollution from human impacts can negatively affect our waterways. Hands-on activities included mini watershed models focusing on how topography affects the flow of water and creating a water filtration device. Students investigated the Smith River to identify macroinvertebrates and other organisms that live beneath the reflective water surface.

Inspire Clean Water with Green Leaves

The Dan River Basin Association's Inspire Clean Water with Green Leaves project had a robust schedule this fall with fourth-grade students in Franklin County participating in the Streamside Trees in the Classroom (STIC) program. DRBA staff, DRBA Volunteer Environmental Educators, and Philpott Lake Army Corps of Engineers staff delivered the native black willow trees to students in mid-September.

A 30-minute presentation was provided to all fourth-grade students at each school explaining the program and providing an Every Kid Outdoors (EKO) free pass to all students. The EKO passes are provided by a federal program and allow fourth-grade students to enter federal parks at no cost with their families up to one year after receiving the pass.





The bare-root stakes were in the classrooms for four weeks while students monitored the growth of the trees and noted any changes that took place while awaiting their upcoming field trip to plant them along a waterway. Students investigated the parts of a tree and discussed why it is important to plant trees along waterways to help control erosion and flooding while also protecting the health of our rivers and streams.

Four planting days were held for the STIC program in October 2024. Of those four Planting Days, three were held for Franklin County Elementary schools. The three Planting Days were held at Philpott Lake's US Army Corps of Engineers parks. Specifically, two days were held at Salthouse Branch Park, in different locations, and the other was held at Jamison Mill Park.

DRBA partnered with eight partners on the STIC project, creating an in-depth learning opportunity for students on their Planting Days. Partners included US Army Corps of Engineers, VA Department of Forestry, VA Department of Agriculture and Consumer Sciences, Blue Ridge Soil & Water Conservation District, Master Naturalists, Volunteer Environmental Educators, Fairy Stone State Park and Reynolds Homestead. Students participated in the erosion game and activities, the trout life cycle game, water safety, wildlife identification, tree identification, invasive species control and tree planting activities.

Over 380 students attended the Franklin County Planting Days – eight of the ten elementary schools participated in the Planting Days.






Volunteer Environmental Educators

Two group trainings for new Volunteer Environmental Educators were held in 2024, along with individual one-on-one trainings for those unable to attend. At the end of 2024, DRBA had 24 active VEEs.

Volunteer Environmental Educators are volunteers that will assist with providing DRBA's education programs to youth throughout the basin. Volunteer educators will have the opportunity to educate youth through hands-on activities in the classroom and on field trips, guided hikes, help at special events and festivals, and recruit new volunteers.

Volunteer educators are trained in four focus areas: Watersheds/Enviroscape model, Water Quality Testing, Hands-On Discovery Activities and Tub of Bugs/Macroinvertebrates.

All volunteer educators must complete an application at www.danriver/VEE, attend a two-hour in-person training, and pass a background check before volunteering. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.
